Project Overview

Tell us a little about your project. What are the main objectives of the project, and who will benefit from it?

The Mayan village of Cesario Blanca Flor Barillas Municipality consists of approximately 110 households with 800 residents. It is located in the Santa Cruz Barilla municipality. West Seattle Rotary completed a mission in early June 2024 to install 106 Aller stoves along with 106 Eco Filter Systems. We also provided funds to make improvements at the school and main village water capture system. While at the village it was made clear to us by the village leadership that the availability of a reliable water capture system to the individual homes in the village was a major priority.

The Blanca Flor Water project is aimed at providing clean, safe, and affordable water to 110 households in the area. The project involves the installation of 120 water catchment systems to ensure that families have access to clean water. This will supplement a community water system improvements funded by the Rotary Club of West Seattle in the main village already providing improved sanitation and critical water storage during the rainy season. Traditionally, water is collected in wood boxes covered in plastic during the rainy season. However, these "open" attachment systems are often exposed to the elements, resulting in contamination. During the prolonged dry season, the nearest water source is a spring that is 2 hours round trip away by foot. This leads to increased "Time Poverty," particularly for women and children, and is a significant component of gender inequality. The project aims to address these issues by improving access to clean, safe, and affordable water, reducing waterborne illnesses, and promoting better health. Furthermore, each family will receive an Eco-Filter, which will reduce the need to boil water, thereby saving on wood consumption. The time savings during the dry season is estimated to be over 144 hours, which can be repurposed for education, economic development, agriculture, care giving, and healthcare. Overall, the Blanca FlorWater project is a crucial step towards improving the lives of the 820 people living in the area. By providing them with clean water, the project will not just improve their health but also promote gender equality and economic prosperity.

Describe the role that host Rotarians will have in this project.

The Rotary Club of Barillas (RCB) was created in 2009 to address the growing needs of the community and surrounding areas in Guatemala. It was sponsored by the Rotary Club of Huehuetenango (RCH), which had been serving a large geographical region in NW Guatemala since 1984. RCH worked collaboratively with RCB to establish the club.

The Rotary Club of Barillas has been actively engaged in addressing the needs of Barillas and over 300 villages in the municipality. Through their concerted efforts, the club has made significant contributions to the community by providing support in areas such as education, healthcare, and infrastructure development. The Rotary Club's commitment to community service has inspired many to join them in their efforts, leading to successful initiatives and partnerships. The club's mission is to continue making a positive impact on the lives of people in Barillas and the surrounding areas.

The Rotary Club of Barillas will work with the staff of Hands for Peacemaking Foundation in the Barillas to assess, plan for, procure supplies, install water tanks, support the community, and evaluate post-installation. RCB has been involved in the research of the community needs and health concerns for this grant. The past president of RCB is the director of the Ministry of Health District in Barillas. All reports will be submitted to RI and the Rotary Club of Everett-Port Gardner in a timely fashion.

Describe the role that international Rotarians will have in this project.

The Rotary Club of West Seattle Seattle, WA USA is raising funds for the Global Grant. They will oversee the distribution of funds and work together with the Rotary Club of Barillas and Hands for Peacemaking Foundation in Guatemala. This partnership aims to successfully execute, implement, and complete the project. Regular reports will be submitted within the timeline required by the RI Global Grant Report Guidelines.

Members of the Rotary Club of West Seattle and other clubs in districts 5030/5050 plan to travel to Guatemala in the Late 2025. They would work alongside the families in the village to help install the water systems and filters in the village of Cesario Blanca Flor.

Describe how the partnership between the host and international sponsors was formed. What agreement have the sponsors made toward ensuring that the project will be implemented successfully? How will they manage any challenges that arise throughout the project?

In early June 2024, after a successful Aller stove project in Blanca Flor, members of the West Seattle Rotary Club and the Rotary Club of Barillas met to discuss mutual interests. At that time it was discussed of the need for water in the village of Blanca Flor. The Barillas club members expressed interest in partnering and describe similar water projects they have worked on. After receiving a formal request from the villagers, Rotary of West Seattle reached out to Rotary of Barillas and they have formally agreed to act as host sponsor for the project.

Project planning

Describe the community needs that your project will address.

Guatemala is the largest and most populous country in Central America. However, its GDP per capita is only about half of that of Brazil, Argentina, and Chile. The agricultural sector makes up a significant portion of the economy, accounting for one-fourth of GDP, two-thirds of exports, and half of the labor force. Although the 1996 peace accords ended the 36-year-long civil war and opened up opportunities for foreign investment, the country still faces challenges such as political violence and corruption scandals that undermine investor confidence. Unfortunately, nearly 75% of the population lives below the poverty line, and 58% of the population is 19 years old or younger.

Santa Cruz Barillas is a municipality located in the northwestern highlands of Guatemala, in the Huehuetenango Department. While it is the second most populated area in Guatemala after the capital, over 70% of the population lives in poverty, with 22% living in extreme poverty and lacking basic necessities. The region is predominantly indigenous Maya, while the rest of the population is Spanish-speaking Latino.

Hands for Peacemaking is an organization based in Santa Cruz Barillas that has worked with rural Mayan villagers for over 35 years. Their focus is on assessing basic needs and finding solutions in healthcare, water and sanitation, economic development, and education.

The Cesario Blanca Flor Water Project is located in a rural, mountainous village in northern Guatemala, about 24 miles from Santa Cruz Barillas. The community lacks running water, modern toilets, and electricity, and the people live in extreme poverty. One of their most pressing needs is access to clean water. The project's objective is to provide access and resources to promote clean water, maternal, and child healthcare for one of the poorest communities in the world. Through the installation of family water tanks and community water systems, they can immediately benefit from clean water and improve the overall healthcare of the area.

How did your project team identify these needs?

Cesario Blanca Flor is located in the Guatemalan highlands, where access to clean water is a daily struggle for millions of people. Due to the long dry season and steep terrain, many families must walk for three hours or more to gather enough water to last them several days. During the rainy season, some collect rainwater in open catchment systems. However, this water is not always reliable. After receiving a request for aid in installing a water catchment system from the villagers Hands for Peacemaking made an onsite visit to the village to determine the project scope and details/

How were members of the benefiting community involved in finding solutions?

120 household heads of the village signed a letter requesting a project to install water catchment/tanks for 120 homes.

Briefly describe the other initiatives and how they relate to this project.

Water Reliability: Clean water is a huge incentive and has been a need for the past four years. Families contribute to the installation of the water tank at their home which will save them 2-3 hours of walking RT in the dry season.

Economic Development: Installation of family-owned water tanks could offer an opportunity/incentive for other employment or income generating activities which will provide added benefit for the family.

Community Development: All families participate with a financial fee to the community water district. This initiative helps the families to feel ownership and pride in their water systems and community water district. This model has been successful with the three other village water projects the Santa Cruz Barillas Rotary Club, Barillas Health District, and Hands for Peacemaking have partnered to implement.

Please describe the training, community outreach, or educational programs this project will include.

HFPPF works to help poor Guatemalans to gain self-sufficiency. Teaching, training, community outreach, and education programs are core to the success of this 35-year-old organization. The Guatemalan staff of HFPPF based in Santa Cruz Barillas, Guatemala provide the majority of this effort. The recipients are selected by the village, self-selection, or involvement in the project.

All HFPPF programs have a lengthy educational pre-identification component and a post-assessment component. The Aller Skill Center trains local Guatemalans every year. Every project is a community-based project requiring up to 9 months of communication and involvement to select the participants and engage them in the next steps.

How were these needs identified?

The community members of Cesario Blanca Flor came to HFPPF in August of 2024 to ask for help with their need for water. The dry season access to water that was 2-3 hours RT travel time to a spring was becoming extremely unreliable and the water source was being severely taxed. In addition to collecting water for drinking and cooking the source was being multiply used by animals and clothes washing.

Hands For Peacemaking staff works with the local village leaders to identify, assess, implement, and evaluate each project. The HFPPF staff make regular visits to the community once a month for 6 months to a year (depending on the project) to ensure the proper use of the equipment (water tank or stove or latrine) and help to fix anything that is broken. HFPPF staff also train members of the village to be able to fix anything that is broken.

What incentives (for example, monetary compensation, awards, certification, or publicity), will you use, if any, to encourage community members to participate in the project?

HFPPF has been working in Guatemala for the past 35 years. They have found that people living in rural communities take much more pride and ownership in a project such as building a school, installing a energy efficient wood burning stove, installing a community water system, and installing a family water tank if they contribute to the project. With schools, this has included bringing rocks to the construction site to use for concrete, providing food for the volunteer builders, and helping to build the school. With water projects HFPPF asks each family for a small cash investment which goes to the community water district to help manage and maintain the water system. The local Health District and HFPPF with Rotary to provide education outreach and resources to train villagers to learn about why clean water is good for them and how dirty water can contribute to so many diseases and health concerns.

The Barillas Health District, HFPPF, and the Rotary Club of Barillas will provide quarterly updates once the tanks are installed to ensure they are being utilized correctly.

HFPPF has installed many water tanks and community water districts over the past 17 years. The process to select vendors is a tried-and-true process. Durman Esquivel Guatemala <http://durman.com>, the water tank and PVC supplier, provides a Quality Certificate to show that their water tanks last for 25 years or more.

Durman has provided the water tanks for the past two village water installation projects.

The Eco-Filter is a Guatemalan design and is produced in country. This widely accepted filtration system is used in a range of applications from primitive solutions such as village application to resort/hotel applications for their guest. <https://ecofiltro.com.gt/>

A HFPPF staff is an Environmental Engineer and is in charge of the project management. This staff person will train several members of the Rotary Club of Barillas and key villagers in Cesario Blanca Flor.

A model for this training has already been developed through meetings with the four previous villages who have received tanks.

The training success will be assessed with the results in 5 months when villagers have embraced ownership of the project. The project includes quarterly community meetings and follow up to ensure proper usage and maintenance of the water tanks and filters.

The community members of Cesario Blanca Flor will be trained as a group and at each family household. HFPPF provides the training on how to repair components that may become damaged during the course of daily use. Community members provide a small remittance to the village governance for replacement parts and repairs.

Founded in 1959, Durman (www.durman.com) began working in Costa Rica in construction. In 1977, Durman opened in Panama and began piping and water systems. In 1988, Durman opened its Guatemalan site. In 2007, Aliaxis Latin America merged with Durman to provide a broad range of services and solutions to the people of Latin America.

On the Durman website they report: Always fresh water with Durman tanks. Antibacterial coating and insulating layer of UV protection, manufactured with the best quality standards. The drinking water storage family has the most innovative filtration technology what allows to retain the solid material ensuring constant clean water supply. The tank is sealed with a removable top to further protect the storage.

The 2,500-liter tanks are designed and built in Guatemala and are extremely adaptable to the urban environment as well as the mountainous regions of the country.

Legal agreement

Global Grant Agreement - to be authorized by the primary contacts and club presidents (or DRFC chairs if district-sponsored)

This Global Grant Agreement (Agreement) is entered into by The Rotary Foundation of Rotary International (TRF) and the grant sponsors (Sponsors). In consideration of receiving this Rotary Foundation Global Grant (Grant) from TRF, the Sponsors agree that:

1. All information contained in this application is, to the best of our knowledge, true and accurate.
2. We have read the Terms and Conditions for Rotary Foundation Global Grants (Terms and Conditions) and will adhere to all policies therein.
3. The Sponsors shall defend, indemnify, and hold harmless Rotary International (RI) and TRF, including their respective directors, trustees, officers, committee members, employees, agents, associate foundations and representatives (collectively Rotary), from and against all claims, including but not limited to claims of subrogation, demands, actions, damages, losses, costs, liabilities, expenses (including reasonable attorney's fees and other legal expenses), awards, judgments, and fines asserted against or recovered from Rotary arising out of any act, conduct, omission, negligence, misconduct, or unlawful act (or act contrary to any applicable governmental order or regulation) resulting directly or indirectly from a Sponsor's and/or participant's involvement in grant-funded activities, including all travel related to the grant.
4. The failure of the parties to comply with the terms of this Agreement due to an act of God, strike, government regulation, war, fire, riot, civil unrest, hurricane, earthquake, or other natural disasters, acts of public enemies, curtailment of transportation facilities, political upheavals, civil disorders, outbreak of infectious disease or illness, acts of terrorism, or any similar cause beyond the control of the parties shall not be deemed a breach of this Agreement. In such an event, the Agreement shall be deemed terminated and the Sponsors shall refund to TRF all unexpended global grant funds within 30 days of termination.
5. TRF's entire responsibility is expressly limited to payment of the total financing amount. TRF does not assume any further responsibility in connection with this grant.
6. TRF reserves the right to cancel the grant and/or this Agreement without notice upon the failure of either or both of the Sponsors to abide by the terms set forth in this Agreement and the Terms and Conditions. Upon cancellation, TRF shall be entitled to a refund from the Sponsors of any global grant funds, including any interest earned, that have not been expended.
7. The laws of the State of Illinois, USA, without reference to its conflicts of laws principles, shall govern all matters arising out of or relating to this Agreement, including, without limitation, its interpretation, construction, performance, and enforcement.
8. Any legal action brought by either party against the other party arising out of or relating to this Agreement must be brought in either, the Circuit Court of Cook County, State of Illinois, USA or the Federal District Court for the Northern District of Illinois, USA. Each party consents to the exclusive jurisdiction of these courts, and their respective appellate courts for the purpose of such actions. Nothing herein prohibits a party that obtains a judgment in either of the designated courts from enforcing the judgment in any other court. Notwithstanding the foregoing, TRF may also bring legal action against Sponsors and/or individuals traveling on grant funds in any court with jurisdiction over them.

9. This Agreement binds and benefits the parties and their respective administrators, legal representatives, and permitted successors and assigns.
10. If any provision of this Agreement is determined to be illegal, invalid or unenforceable, the remaining provisions of this Agreement shall remain in full force and effect.
11. Sponsors may not assign any of their rights under this Agreement except with the prior written consent of TRF. Sponsors may not delegate any performance under this Agreement without the prior written consent of TRF. Any purported assignment of a Sponsor's rights or delegation of performance without TRF's prior written consent is void.
12. TRF may assign some or all of its rights under this Agreement to an associate foundation of TRF. TRF may delegate any performance under this Agreement to an associate foundation. Any other purported assignment of TRF's rights or delegation of performance without the Sponsors' prior written consent is void.
13. Sponsors will comply with all economic and trade sanctions, including those implemented by the Office of Foreign Assets Control (OFAC) of the United States Department of Treasury, and will ensure that they do not support or promote violence, terrorist activity or related training, or money laundering.
14. This Agreement constitutes the final agreement between the parties. No amendment or waiver of any provision of this Agreement shall be effective unless it is in the form of a writing signed by the parties.
15. Rotary may use information contained in this application and subsequent reports for promotional purposes, such as in Rotary magazine, in Rotary Leader, on rotary.org and on social media.
